## **Children's play & autism spectrum disorder | Raising ...**

Conduct a FBA to determine the function of the problem behavior and create a behavior plan. Work on these behaviors before introducing peers into the play sessions. Talk and make sounds during play. Children typically talk or babble while they are playing (even if they play alone) so be sure to model this.

## **Let's Play! - I Love ABA!**

Play helps to develop social skills. Children with autism show deviances in their play behavior that may be associated with delays in their social development. In this study, we investigated manipulative, functional and symbolic play behavior of toddlers with and without autism (mean age: 26.45, SD5.63).
